DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME



On Sunday morning at 2:00 AM on March 8, 2026 it will be the official start of Daylight-Saving Time for 2026 and we will be “springing ahead” again and paying back that extra hour of sleep we gained last November. So, how did we get started with this time shift each year. Some say Benjamin Franklin deserves the credit for the idea for Daylight Saving Time, but, it’s not really true. In reality, it was the bugs that caused the seed to be planted and the person who got the ball rolling in 1895 was New Zealand postal worker (and entomologist-bug scientist) named George Hudson, who wanted not one but two more daylight hours for his after-work hobby ... bug collecting. In 1907, Englishman William Willet, wrote a book called *The Waste of Daylight*, arguing for a Daylight-Saving Time. “The sun shines upon the land for several hours each day while we are asleep,” he wrote, but there “remains only a brief spell of declining daylight in which to spend the short period of leisure at our disposal.” Willet lobbied the British Parliament for the change, saying it would increase people’s enjoyment of sunlight and also save money on fuel, but it wasn’t passed. During World War 1 Germany implemented Daylight Saving Time as a war time measure to conserve energy and Great Britain and the United States followed. After World War 1 the United States stopped it and contrary to some beliefs the farm lobby campaigned aggressively against Daylight Saving Time because it gave them one less hour in the morning to milk their cows and send their crops to market. The United States again implemented Daylight Saving Time during World War 2 and got rid of it as soon as the war ended. The reason we have Daylight Saving Time today is because when it went away at the national level, state and local governments were free to decide the time for themselves. The result? Chaos. In the mid-1960s, one 35 mile bus route from Ohio to West Virginia went through seven different time zones. To stop the confusion, in 1966, Lyndon Johnson signed a bill making Daylight Saving Time national, however, it is still a never-ending debate. Many States have petitioned the government to keep the same time standard all year long. Supported by one important reason: **THE HUMAN BODY IS NOT DESIGNED TO RESET ITS INTERNAL CLOCK!** Our health is deeply tied to our circadian rhythms, the cues our body takes from time. Fiddling with that system is asking for trouble. Heart attacks spike by around 25% when the clocks spring forward. Also, there are studies that show there are more fatal car accidents, and if you find yourself in the ER — you should know that healthcare workers tend to make more errors after the time change too. The rationale that Daylight Saving Time conserves energy doesn’t hold up. Research from the U.S. Department of Energy found that electricity use barely declines at all with longer daylight hours. Studies suggest that the decrease in people using lights is more than offset by the increase in people using air conditioning or heating. So, what do you think?

VETERAN'S BURIAL FLAGS

Although many ESC residents have either consciously or unconsciously seen the folded United States burial Flag in the display case on top of the storage lockers on the north wall of the Clubhouse, there are very few that know the history of the Flag in the wooden case, but first a little history about the use of burial Flags in our country.

The custom of draping a Flag over a coffin began during the Napoleonic Wars (early 1800's) and was adopted in the U.S. during the Civil War. The practice grew in popularity following the USS Maine explosion in Havana Harbor in 1898 and was officially utilized during World War I. In 1923, Congress authorized the government to provide burial Flags to Veterans who couldn't afford one. In 1930 the law was changed to make it a free benefit for all eligible Veterans. More than 40 million American men and women have defended freedom in the uniform of our Military Services. The red, white, and blue of the American Flag covering their casket upon death, is a final tribute to the men and women who have secured the blessings of liberty. The flag is provided by the VA and can be obtained through funeral directors or U.S. Post Offices. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) issues almost a half-million burial Flags to drape the caskets of deceased veterans each year. Any honorably discharged veteran is entitled to a burial Flag which, upon internment, is folded and presented to the family as a keepsake. In 1949, the Department of Defense established the protocol for folding the Flag into a tricorn shape (representing Revolutionary War hats) and presenting it to the next of kin. Many of us have witnessed this ceremony at a memorial of a deceased veteran. The Flag represents national gratitude for the veteran's service. The 13 folds symbolize various aspects of the nation and faith. This is what the 13 folds mean:

1. The first fold of our Flag is a symbol of life.
2. The second fold signifies our belief in eternal life.
3. The third fold is made in honor and tribute of the veteran departing our ranks, and who gave a portion of his or her life for the defense of our country to attain peace.
4. The fourth fold exemplifies our weaker nature as citizens trusting in God; it is to Him we turn for His divine guidance.
5. The fifth fold is an acknowledgement to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right, but it is still our country, right or wrong."
6. The sixth fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.
7. The seventh fold is a tribute to our armed forces, for it is through the armed forces that we protect our country and our Flag against all enemies.
8. The eighth fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor our mother, for whom it flies on Mother's Day.
9. The ninth fold is an honor to womanhood, for it has been through their faith, love, loyalty, and devotion that the character of men and women who have made this country great have been molded.
10. The 10th fold is a tribute to father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since he or she was first-born.
11. The 11th fold, in the eyes of Hebrew citizens, represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies, in their eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.
12. The 12th fold, in the eyes of a Christian citizen, represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in their eyes, God the Father, the Son, and Holy Ghost.
13. The last fold, when the Flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost, reminding us of our national motto, "In God We Trust."

Now getting back to the history of the Flag on display in the ESC Clubhouse. The Flag was to honor and show gratitude for ESC resident and veteran Harold "Hal" Burnham who passed away in 2007. Hal was a US Air Force veteran of the Vietnam War having served from 1959-1963. The Flag eventually found its way to ESC's "Flagman" Jay Hatcher and Jay established a resting place for it in the ESC Clubhouse. Jay, for many years, has been a member of **Freedom Eagles**. This group collected Flags and delivered them to funeral homes to cover our veterans at time of cremation. Jay feels that the Flag should be appropriately displayed to honor and also serve as a memorial to all Veterans at ESC thanking them for their service to the United States of America. In the near future a plaque will be added to the display Flag to recognize and honor all ESC Shareholders that served in our military and have passed.



FOR THE GOOD OF THE COMMUNITY

Defibrillator - There is a Defibrillator that can be used for emergency purposes. It is located to the left of the Clubhouse exit doors leading to the pool area. Please note its location as it can be used to save someone's life. Instructions for use are also included so training is not necessarily needed.

Water Consumption – Collier County is under a Water Shortage Warning. There is no irrigation allowed on Fridays or any day between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. If your address ends in an odd number, irrigation should only take place on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday. If your address ends in an even number, then irrigation should only take place Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday. Lawn sprinklers must be operated according to existing Collier County ordinances and ESC policy or restrictions. ESC policy is odd addresses water on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday. Even number addresses can water on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday. Hand watering can be done at any time. Lawn sprinklers can be operated for a maximum of 15 minutes per session. Irrigation Systems must conform to Collier County's Ordinance requiring "Rain Shutoff" devices in order to conserve water. The only approved ESC "Rain Shutoff" device is the "reservoir or rain-retention" type. These devices must be tested and be in working order before the start of the "dry" season (October through May). During the "wet" season (June through September) automatically controlled sprinkler systems must be shut off. Please ensure that usage issues within your home (leaky faucets, running toilets and piping leaks) are promptly addressed. A testing device, along with instructions, is available at the ESC office to leak test your own plumbing.

Observe Speed Limits – Along with the winter season comes an increase in the number of pedestrians, bicycles and vehicles. The speed limit posted throughout the park is **10 mph**. As per our rules/regulations (section 18), this speed limit applies to all motor vehicles, bicycles and motorized bikes. Please observe the limit to ensure the safety of all. Slow down Please!

Night Biking - If you are riding your bike at night in the community, please make sure you have a light on so cars and other vehicles traveling can see you. Collier County statute pertaining to night riding reads: ***A bicycle operated between sunset and sunrise must be equipped with a light on the front that is visible from 500 feet and both a rear reflector and a red light on the rear visible from 600 feet.***

Night Pedestrians – Please wear light colored or reflective clothing when walking at night. It's also important to walk on the left side of the road if there are no sidewalks, facing oncoming traffic.

Henderson Creek - Florida Wildlife Conservation Commission relayed the importance of not leaving any trash, chairs, fishing gear or evidence other than foot prints while visiting the manatee pond area at Henderson's creek, behind our boatyard. You can bring these items, just be sure to take everything back with you. The inspector warned that if we do not follow this rule, the area could possibly be gated off with a no trespassing sign.




